Voluntary human extinction movement accelerating as awareness rises

"Movement" in the voluntary human extinction movement refers to the transfer of an idea from one person to another. The idea that Earth would be better off without humans is moving faster and in more directions than ever before.

Publications around the globe are picking up the story of VHEMT. Virtually all recognize the benevolent nature of our message, and present it with respect.

London's international *Independent On Sunday*¹ ran an extensive article favorable to the VHEMT plan. *Earth Island Journal*² dedicated a full page to The Movement. *Toward Freedom*³ included us in their demography column "Head Count".

A BBC radio program, *Outlook*⁴, interviewed Les U. Knight and broadcast it throughout the world on long and short waves.

Kooks⁵, a book documenting outrageous beliefs, supportively included the VHEMT perspective in depth. We might seem like kooks today, but that's the way of new discoveries: ridicule, then discussion, then acceptance.

Small publications too numerous to mention have reprinted pieces from *These* EXIT *Times* and have given glowing recommendations, resulting in many contacts from people who thought they were the only ones who realized this simple truth. As others allow themselves to independently think through the Earth's situation, using logic and love, they will eventually arrive at the same conclusion and solution. This, too, is part of The Movement, and, when this spontaneous generation occurs in the minds of those who speak other languages, tedious translations from English are avoided.

Volunteers are sharing the message at Earth Day booths and tables, conferences, radio talk shows, social gatherings, and anywhere we have the chance. Awareness is rising and The Movement is advancing.

Sticking labels of any kind on others, or on ourselves, diminishes individuality and diversity. We are our Selves, not what we do. We share common ground, but each of us is unique. Identifying people as *being* an occupation, belief system, activity, diet, genetic background, geographical location, or whatever, reduces noble Homo sapiens to just another member of some homogenous group: one of *those*.

I do, however, identify myself as a VHEMT Volunteer, and tend to think of folks who are not yet as being potential Volunteers. Since Volunteers have no stereotype, this doesn't seem hypocritical to me, just paradoxical.

Volunteers are so diverse in religious, political, and philosophical viewpoints that sometimes The Movement

is the only thing we have in common.

Some are Volunteers for humanitarian reasons, some out of ecological considerations, and most of us are motivated, to some degree, by a combination of concern for both planet and people.

A few misanthropes... rather, misanthropically inclined could no doubt be found among us, but they tend to be softies. While hardcore misanthropics are wishing for new diseases, Volunteers tend to hope for new contraceptives.

Some are parenting, some are not, and some are in between. Age, gender, income, education, and all those demographic factors also seem widely varied.

We're a motley crew, and that's what makes The Movement so dynamic. Our differences enable us to reach a broad portion of society in more meaningful ways.

To stay united, we just have to tolerate each other's differences... which shouldn't be hard as long as no one

starts calling those darn meetings.

Volunteers have been active around the world, and many of these activities require meetings, but those tend to be *ad hoc*, and avoid the regularly scheduled rituals of old and new business according to *Robert's Rules of Order*.

This is what *I* think of meetings, but activities of Volunteers can't be restricted by some hierarchical cabal unleashing the dogma. All who consider themselves VHEMT Volunteers automatically have the authority to publish newsletters, make statements to the media, organize events, and so on. No one, however, can speak for all of us. Beginning any statement with "We believe" most likely renders it false. However, it does seem to me that the motto is sort of a manifesto: the foundation of whatever we

choose to do as Volunteers. The Movement has no followers, only leaders, leading the way to a better future for all life on planet Earth.

Virtually all Volunteers have loved ones who grant us the unsolicited honors of being aunt, uncle, grandparent, or even sibling. My daughter and her husband have become Volunteers following the birth of their only heir in September of 1993. What to do? I like being around most children and enjoy my grandson, so it's easy for me. I say make the best of it whatever your feelings, just don't let 'em be hard feelings. Each person we meet is another potential Volunteer, no matter what their age. If at first you don't succeed...

I hope you enjoy this issue and will be inspired to write in with comments, suggestions and questions. Consider this *your* newsletter. Although I write most of it, put it together, decide what goes in and what gets censored... I mean, edited out, I'd like more Volunteers to use this forum to share their views, advice, and experiences with each other.

In upcoming issues I hope to feature discussions on a variety of topics pertaining to voluntary human extinction. I need your help to do it properly. Pronatalism, malebased contraception, vasectomy projects, fertility, disincentives to breeding, "license to breed", and many other topics are in need of discussion. STOP AT TWO?

"Stop at two" may have been a radical proclamation when ZPG was founded 26 years ago, but it was barely adequate even then. Replacement level fertility of 2.1 wouldn't bring about true zero population growth until well into the next century, due to momentum.

Today the message is only slightly revised: "Consider having none or one, and be sure to stop after two."

The notion that producing two descendants simply replaces a couple and creates no increased impact is specious. We aren't salmon: we don't spawn and die. Most of us will be around to see our progeny beget, and those begotten beget to boot.

When a couple of us "replaces" ourselves, our environmental impact doubles -- assuming our off-springs' lifestyles are as environmentally friendly as ours, and that

they won't reproduce themselves.

The "stop at two" message actually *encourages* reproduction by "qualified" couples. A wanted child is better than unwanted, intelligent (whatever that is) better than stupid, and well-cared-for better than neglected, but each of us in the industrialized world has a huge impact on Nature regardless of these factors.

For example, in terms of energy consumption, when we stop at two it's about the same as an average Ethiopian

couple stopping at a thousand.

Two is better than four, and one is twice as good as two, but to intentionally set out to make even one more of us today is too much like selling berths on a sinking ship.

As vehement Volunteers know, regardless of how many off-spring we have or haven't produced, rather than stop at two, we must stop at once.

Non-parents' choices increase as affinity groups organize

In the 1970s, the National Organization for Nonparents (N.O.N.) provided social contacts for people whose lives were not child-oriented. It successfully provided support and grew large.

The name was changed to the National Organization of Optional Parenthood in an attempt to broaden their membership, however, ZPG already had that ministry, and it

eventually folded.

Now at least three organizations in North America offer non-parents assistance: Childfree Network (CFN), Childless by Choice (CbC), and No Kidding! (NK!).

CFN makes no distinction about why no children. The rights of those who aren't parenting are being infringed upon in favor of those who are, and CFN proposes something be done about it.

CbC considers the distinction between choosing nonparenthood and suffering from infertility important enough to make it their focus, and also favors equal rights. NK! was founded in 1984 with goals similar to N.O.N. Vancouver-area members host social activities several times a month, and prospective members are welcome. A 24-hour "activities line" gives recorded information on upcoming events. A \$15 donation will get you a kit for setting up your own chapter.

Both CFN and CbC provide networking for members to form local groups and sell coffee cups. If you're not parenting, and are interested, I recommend requesting information from each to see which best fits your needs.

Parental status is irrelevant to being a Volunteer, since the distinction that *really* matters is the decision to produce no more of us.

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Grim Reaper to the rescue!

Will super hero Grim Reaper pull our precious Gaia from the brink of ecological catastrophe in time? Will generous, sweeping strokes of his deadly scythe mow down millions of humans, stopping us before we destroy ourselves and our host?

Grim Reaper's henchmen, Famine, Disease, and War, joined lately by mutant cousin, Plutonium, are harvesting



as fast as ever, and haven't kept up with our rank growth.

Yet, despite Death's dismal record for slowing human population growth, some today advocate utilizing more of his services for the benefit of all. They're trying to make him seem good.

Like Pentti Linkola of Saaksmaki, Finland, quoted in the *Wall Street Journal*¹. Another world war, he says (in Finnish), would be "a happy occasion for the planet ... If there were a button I could press, I would sacrifice myself without hesitating if it meant millions would die."

He didn't say how many millions he wants to play lemming with, but even a hundred million would only eliminate one year's growth. It wouldn't rescue Gaia, and we'd be stuck with all those bodies. Yuck. Even Garrett "Let 'em Starve" Hardin balks at Linkola's hard-nosed philosophy: "We have many possibilities which should be explored before we take a strong-arm approach," he cautions.

Weekly World News² tells the story of two escaped French chemists, Henri Mevel and Jean-Michael DuPont, who allegedly plan to poison every human on the planet to "save it from pollution and overpopulation." Interpol's

Marc Jubert admits, "we don't know exactly what Mevel and DuPont are making but if we don't stop them in time the results would be devastating. They may be mad, but they aren't crazy."

Well, even with their "network of 2,000 radical environmentalists around the world," there's no way they'll even approach Linkola's magic-button body count: a

paltry 2% of us.

Equally incredible is a *Newhouse News Service*³ story about former CIA chief of counter-terrorism, Vincent M. Cannistraro. He envisions "highly educated scientists... (in) small organized clandestine cells working on the development of technologies to diminish or even eliminate the race of man [sic] from the Earth." The article also cites the voluntary human extinction movement, in hopes of adding credence to this fantasy.

There may very well be well-funded, clandestine cells of scientists working to eliminate large numbers of people. However, saving planet Earth is probably not one of their

motives.

The Church of Euthanasia advocates what many think of when they hear about VHEMT for the first time: suicide for Earth's sake. Founder Chris Korda, in their newsletter Snuff It⁴, encourages those who are truly serious about saving the planet to kill themselves. A Volunteer facetiously suggested that, if Rev. Korda is serious, he should "put his shotgun where his mouth is." Let's hope he's not.

The Gaia Liberation Front⁵ favors people killing each other as in wars, but prefers "hand-to-hand combat, or better yet, biological agents that kill only humans".

No matter how many millions are sacrificed by the Grim Reaper, and for whatever reason, benefits to Gaia would be minimal. In fact, high death rates cause high birth rates, often resulting in a net increase. Post-war baby booms quickly replace the dead of both victor and vanquished.

In Wild Earth, 6 your editor examines the infamous Bubonic Plague's effect on western civilization's census report: "Immediately after this minor blip [see graph], our numbers began to shoot for the moon. The industrial revolution was no doubt a factor in allowing us to burgeon to the bursting point, but the Black Death may be the reason we want to breed like bunnies. Burned into our collective memory was the horror of massive deaths of our kind. Our reaction as a species, naturally, has been fertility with a vengeance."

To cope with this rampant fertility, I conclude, "...reproductive freedom, economic opportunity, and education are far more effective methods of improving the ratio of people-to-wildlife than promoting death could ever be."

No, the Grim Reaper is not Gaia's knight in shining armor — he can't just kill the stork. We are the potential See Grim Reaper page 5...

Dear Les U. Knight, New Moon October 1992



Twenty-six fertile men entered, demonstrating the need for low-cost surgical contraception for men.

Coverage of the event in a local paper tacked on a urology clinic's comment that they "don't recommend vasectomies for single men, whose aversion to fatherhood may change after meeting that special someone later in life. A vasectomy reversal can be a pricey procedure, often ranging close to five times the original operation's cost." Oh my, how dreadful.

So, in the meantime, his not-so-special lovers will mess with dangerous, unreliable contraceptives, have abortions, miscarriages, and unwanted live births, just to keep his options open.

Five times the cost of a vasectomy reversal is still half the cost of a tubal ligation, and a minute fraction of the cost to raise someone to adulthood. And what about sperm banks? No reversal, just withdrawal of deposits.

Ignorance and superstition continue to surround male surgical contraception, though it's the surest, safest, and most economical contraceptive available. In the US, only 20% of men over 30 have taken full responsibility for contraception. Even subtracting gay, infertile, and celibate cohorts from the computation, this tally is abysmal. Men can do better. Unwanted conceptions strike millions of women — every one caused by a man.

Future Valentines Day vasectomy drawings will be sponsored by Respect for Life, a humanitarian organization promoting reproductive freedom, and currently focusing on male responsibility for preventing pregnancies.

Director Rev. Barron explains, "It's time we advanced the definition of reproductive freedom beyond a woman's right to safe and legal access to contraception and abortion. Women should be free from *needing* abortions, and from suffering the harmful side effects of female-based contraceptives." Barron hopes to unite people from all sides of the abortion debate. "Preventing unwanted pregnancies is the common ground for pro-choice, antiabortion, and other human rights activists," he states.

i Red Herring alert!

Have you caught wind of this one? "Over-population is more a symptom than a cause of our fundamental problems."

So, this means that Earth has too many people on it *because* of our problems rather than Earth having problems because there are too many people on it.

It's like:

"Gee, Dear, there's sure a lot of noise and pollution in the air."

"Yeah, I wish we could breathe"

"Huh? Oh, we can still breed. C'mon, coff, coff, let's make more of us."

Or maybe you can imagine:

"I'm outta work, homeless, and got a bad disease... makes me feel like creating an heir to share all this with."

Our biggest problem, destruction of Earth's biosphere, is undoubtedly a symptom rather than a cause of overpopulation.

In addition, problems like high mortality rates, a lack of care for the elderly, low status for women and their subsequent loss of reproductive freedom all significantly contribute to high birth rates. In return, an excess of humans makes each of those problems worse. In some ways, over-population is both a symptom and a cause: a self-perpetuating, malicious cycle.

In contrast, voluntary human extinction is a positively motivated, beneficial cycle of solutions and benefits for all. Besides being a "symptom" of a heightened awareness, The Movement is "causing" a higher awareness. (Do I hear an "Amen, Sibling"?)

Whether our problems are symptoms or causes, they'll be more easily solved when there are fewer of us.

Modern male rite of passage has roots in tribal scarification ritual

To Les U. Knight -

Lately, groups of so-called Modern Primitives have received attention through various media. These MPs appear to enjoy tattooings, piercings, and other forms of ritual body-change as a means of increasing personal ownership of the body and group identity. While the only markings on my flesh are freckles, chicken pox scars, and occasional pimples, I have been inspired by these primitives to come up with an idea for a Modern Male Tribal Initiation Scarification Ritual: the vasectomy.

Many aboriginal cultures have employed various means to mark the transition from boyhood to manhood, as well as from girlhood to womanhood. Much of the angst and isolation of modern culture comes from the lack of a meaningful tribal mythology which celebrates and marks the cycles of life.

I propose that one way this dearth could be cured would be to have a vasectomy ceremony for males at puberty, to mark their transition from carefree boys to men who must learn and practice sexual, social, and ecological ethics for membership in the global community.

The initiation would be a voluntary event, educating the boys on the implications, procedures, and options. I feel this would bond men together in a new way, reducing the blind competition and violence which have marked our species since the beginning of our spawning days. Correspondingly, a population of sterile men would not dominate women through their genetic claim on women's offspring.

Simply setting an example by living well and being happy presents our decision in a good light. For many potential Volunteers, this is enough help, so never underestimate your passive influence.

But, if you want to be more active in helping others make progress along their Paths of Awareness (see T.E.T.

#1), the following may be helpful.



The better you understand your potential Volunteer, the better you'll be able to help them along. We really must be able see things their way before we can help them see things from our perspective.

During this interview stage, you may be given opportunities to explain the VHEMT concept. A quick phrase that sums things up might be all you have a chance to say. You

needn't hurry; this often takes years.

It helps to match the approach to fit your friend, but whatever you find most comfortable is probably best. Ask

leading questions and listen.

A logical approach is the only one some will recognize. The VHEMT concept only requires a few steps of logic. Keep it simple. If logic appeals to your friend but not to you, just share the concept and a graph; they can take it from there.

• A philosophical or theoretical approach avoids de-

ciding whether VHEMT can really work or not.

 A moralistic approach is dangerous because it's hard to keep from sounding judgmental. Even though preserving life on Earth is basically a moral issue, use caution in mentioning this aspect.

 A humorous approach runs the risk that you won't be taken seriously, but it's generally less threatening and can

avoid negative feelings. It's fun, too.

An intellectual approach bores some, but adds cred-

ibility for others.

• The effectiveness of a personal approach depends on which person you are being personal about: you or your friend. It's fine to use your life as an example for discussion, but it's safer to let others make applications to their own lives.

 Shock approach. A good way to get nowhere fast is to attempt to shock your friend with horror stories about overpopulation. If they haven't listened before, they won't

hear you now either.

Decide how much your friend is ready to think about. For some, an explanation of the goal of preserving life on Earth might be the limit for a first exposure. Others can handle the whole concept and add to it for good measure.

You'll have another chance if you don't go far enough, but if you go too far, it may be the last time they listen to you.

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Sexy Stats

Sex is the way most babies are started, but is sexual activity *really* the primary cause of human reproduction? Let's consider the statistics:

The World Health Organization estimates that 100 million couples engage in sexual intercourse on an average day, which is only 3.6% of the world's 5.6 billion humans. This pitifully low figure results in around 910,000 pregnancies. For a variety of reasons, 55% of these zygotes don't make it through fetushood to live birth. According to the Population Reference Bureau estimate, 387,000 do make it daily.

So, less than 0.4% of each day's heterosexual trysts result in the creation of new humans — a statistically insignificant correlation for proving causation.

Try it for yourself. Estimate how many times you've engaged in sexual activity in your lifetime. Now estimate how many times you were trying to make a baby. Divide the little number by the big number to give you the percent of times sex and procreation have simultaneously motivated you. Now, how often were you striving for preservation of our species?

Perhaps if there were more opportunities for sexual gratification, so many people wouldn't feel the need to fill a nagging emptiness with a needy dependent.

How many times have you heard that one? We can be sure they're not talking about themselves: it's those wrong people. It's those stupid, slack-jawed degenerates who shouldn't breed. Those too poor to raise children, or so warped they don't even like children and might abuse them. Certainly, this logic follows, bad genetic specimens should never duplicate their defects.

Implicit in these opinions is the attitude that some people are the right people to pass along their genes. Smart, financially secure, responsible, socially aware people with superior genes ought to make more of each

other. After all, someone is going to, right?

Maybe so, but even if intelligence could be measured or inherited, there's no evidence that smart people's cars pollute less than morons'. And, since the wealthy are better able to provide materially for their dependents than are the economically disadvantaged, they're also likely to do the most damage to the environment with their excessive consumption.

Some say that their religious or political belief system needs more members to make the world a better place, but there's no guarantee that off-spring will follow the traditions of their parents. In fact, just the opposite seems to be the norm in modern societies. Besides, if the only people who will accept a belief system are those born into it, there

must be some serious flaws in that system.

Others contend that their race or ethnic group is in the minority, or will be soon if they don't keep up. Carrying on the family name has long been an unquestioned justification for reproduction, and when a couple says they want to "have one of our own," they mean "make one that has our genes." The mindset behind this bloodline mentality is deep and strong: more of "Us" and less of "Them". Smells like racism to me. When couples try to conceive a specific gender, sexism is also in the wind. It goes beyond racism for us to create replicas of ourselves while tens of thousands of Others' children die from lack of care each day.

Anyway, simply increasing the sheer numbers of people who share a philosophy or genetic makeup doesn't always improve their status. "Breeding wars" between rival groups have shifted political power in a few majority-rule governments, however, members of those groups usually aren't any better off just by being in a larger voting block. Really, as Volunteers know, it's the wrong species "having children". Regardless of our superficial differences, we are all Homo sapiens. As long as extinctions of wildlife continue at an outrageous pace, the intentional creation of another one of us can't be justified.
